THE NSW Sliders have returned from Adelaide after winning an unprecedented clean sweep at the Australian Broomball Championships.

The Sliders won all five divisions; women's elite, men's elite, mixed elite, mixed intermediate and men's intermediate competitions.

Broomball is a variation of ice hockey, where players wear special shoes to run on the ice and try to hit a ball into the goals. Teams have six players, including one goalkeeper, two defenders and three forwards.

At national level, men's and women's games are full contact, meaning players can use their bodies to stop opposition players from passing or running with the ball.

The NSW competition, based at the Penrith Ice Palace, has always shown a great depth of talent by dominating the intermediate divisions since they became part of the Australian championships in 2001.

NSW has further cemented its broomball prowess in recent years in the elite divisions.

A tough training regime leading up to the championships paid off for the NSW women, who had no


